Welcoming People

A woman in the US was recently filmed berating a family for speaking Spanish in a restaurant. She accused them of being illegal immigrants and demanded to see their passports. For her efforts, she was banned from the restaurant.

But we are not like that. We are a welcoming people.

Not long ago, I heard of a community interest group that was going through internal squabbles. Several people left the group and others reported leaving several years earlier for the same reason – ongoing relationship conflicts between rival groups.

But we are not like that. We are a welcoming people.

I was saddened to hear of a refugee walking down the street in Sunbury only to have local people yell abuse at her out of their car window.

But we are not like that. We are a welcoming people.

In church on an occasion some children were a little noisy as they enjoyed the toys and books at the back. A woman turned around and glared at the mother. The mother stopped coming to church and so therefore did the children. Some people we don't want in our groups – unless of course they change to fit in.

However, we are welcoming people... aren't we? Certainly, to those we know we are. To those who we are friends with we are. To those who don't disrupt or challenge we are.

There are many ways we help people fit too. We tell them how we do things. We all dress a particular way. We ignore ideas we don't like. We invite some to our activities but forget to tell others. We ask for helpers but forget to mention expectations to some. We speak questioningly about ideas and things they like to do. Some subtle and others not quite so.

But aren't we a welcoming people?

Mark tells the story of a blind man, a beggar that no one even knows his first name. He tells another story of some mums who wanted to bring their children to Jesus. In each case, the disciples tried to shield Jesus from such distractions and interruptions. Jesus was engaged in some important stuff and on his way to change the country!

But aren't we a welcoming people?

Jesus blessed the children and welcomed them. Jesus welcomed the blind man. Jesus took time with the man suffering mental illness. Jesus was gentle with the woman living in shame. When barriers were identified, Jesus changed to open up to the foreigner.

Yes, Jesus did the changing. He didn't wait for the other to change. Jesus healed, taught, blessed,

and welcomed first. Each person then decided their response. Jesus did not dictate what it should be.

It has been said that the church is the one organisation that exists for those that don't belong. It may have been once but I suspect it is no longer. Sometimes I think we only exist for ourselves. We resist change and difference, just like everyone else does. We look out for that which suits us. Maybe we need to pause and note the walls and barriers we put in the way of others. Maybe we need to listen for the cries for help. Maybe we need to pause when we react against an idea. Maybe we need to ask the question, what do I need to do to be more open?

Jesus welcomes. Jesus says come. Jesus says do not hinder. What do we say?





Coco Report for Meeting held on Saturday 6th October 2018 at Gisborne UC

Chairperson Colin welcomed everyone to the Meeting, especially Presbytery Representatives Iris and Judy.

Paul lead us in a thought about focusing on people (not electronic devices) relating to the future of the Partnership. Personal connections and conversations are of great importance. The need to share with others what God has done for us.

Peter presented the Ministry Team Report, this will be published in Partnership In Print. Also available in the individual Churches or ask your CoCo Rep.

The Meeting focused on issues arising from the recently completed Review and the recommendations Rev. Rose Broadstock has presented to us.

- Fatigue seen as an issue Managing the Worship Rosters at some Churches (not all). The Tylden people managing the Op.Shop – a lot of work involved. Mainly it seems that fatigue comes from our people getting older, health problems, family needs and other commitments.
- Vision There was a lot of discussion on this with input from the Ministry Team and CoCo Reps and some comments from Presbytery Reps.
 - Need for Prayer for the Partnership discerning what God would have us do.
 - Agree on approach to affirming the Worship and Witness of each Congregation while still being willing to change styles within reason.
 - Be willing to put support behind the Woodend and Riddells Creek initiatives as a priority. Also support, where able, initiatives from other Congregations.
 - Communication Jay finds it difficult to get detailed info for PIP. This is an important tool for sharing Partnership happenings. Suggestion of a BLOG to Share items as they arise. Need to make sure those who don't use electronic devices

are not left out of the loop.

 Leadership – Peter will identify where support is needed in Worship leadership around the Partnership. He will mentor those who need support.

He will work to support ideas and proposals in different churches to promote energy and creativity.

We also need to be aware that a complete Worship Service is presented on the Website each week and can be used by whoever is taking the Service as a whole or use parts of it. (Great resource).

We need to be aware we may only have a 1.5 level of paid Ministry in the Partnership in a couple of years and we have to make provision of this in our planning.

We then moved on to our usual Business.

It was reported that the <u>Banners</u> for each Church are about to be printed.

Worship Roster for the next 3 months will soon be available. Some innovations will happen in our January Services. The feeling was the Worship Roster will continue to evolve.

<u>The property team</u> reported that the planning stage at the Woodend U.C. property is well in progress. No progress at the Riddell's Creek property currently.

Financial Report presented - all OK.

Reports from each of the Churches showed all the usual happenings were progressing well. Many properties being utilized for other activities as well. Also some of our Churches being used for Weddings and Funerals. Please see PIP for all the happenings and support where possible.

It was decided to have an additional CoCo Meeting on <u>Saturday 3rd November at Tylden</u> to continue our discussions in regard to building a plan for on-going Missional Outreach at Riddell's Creek and Woodend.

Ministers' report CoCo 6th October 2018, Gisborne

There has been much discussion around the vision of the Partnership arising from the review process. Many have affirmed it in their responses yet others have expressed uncertainty as to its meaning and others have been cynical of the value of a vision. I wish to share an innocuous story of something that happened to me as a lad. Maybe it will shed some light.

I was walking to school around Lake Wendouree in Ballarat, I was a lad of about 12. The water level was low and so the mud floor of the lake was exposed. While walking, I saw a tennis ball about 10 meters from the edge, sitting on top of the mud. It looked to be within easy reach to my young eyes. They lit up. A tennis ball at recess was a prize item. I took a couple of steps out and while mushy, I was able to easily progress... until I took one step too many - only a couple of meters to go and my foot just sank into the mud. I was up to my knee! The mud held me as it seems to do. My eyes went now to my predicament and I turned for the shore as things threatened to only get worse. I struggled but was able to get out. I never did get that ball!

Hope drew me. I had a vision of what could be. The problems I faced overwhelmed and I lost faith that I could achieve my dream and I gave up. I was on my own. I had no encouragement but instead experienced guilt and fear as to what might happen when my mother saw the condition of my trousers and shoes!

A vision statement is a dream of what can be. It sets before us an image of who and what we want to be and achieve. The prophet Joel says that God will pour out God's Spirit upon the young and old alike, on women and men, girls and boys and they shall dream dreams and have visions. It is a word of hope at a time of despair and discouragement. We are told its fulfilment is begun at Pentecost.

Vision is essential for movement towards a new future. A vision gives us something to reach for and hope in. It is transformative. Faith keeps us going when we are disheartened and discouraged and love binds us together to provide energy for the journey.

My story was one where discouragement won out. It does not always have to be that way. As congregations, we have seen decline. Energy dissipates as our attempts to grow have limited success and so discouragement sets in. The dream of the Partnership gave hope. It brought us together (love) and our faith was encouraged that maybe something could be different.

With this in mind, it is critical for our life as a Partnership to keep the vision and its values central. Ensuring there is a constant conversation between plans, activities and our vision helps us stay focused. We keep reaching for our hope and trust in the movement of God's Spirit. We support each other in love. We look for the signs of life and seek encouragement for each other.

Sometimes growth and signs of life are hard to see and discouragement can resurface. New eyes may be needed and a willingness to trust and wait. Such patience is rewarded.

In my short (and disrupted) time among you, adjusting to new ways of fulfilling my calling and role has been challenging. I am working over 12 communities, in a team for the first time, trying to focus attention to new ways and only seeing many of you briefly and intermittently. This can easily be a recipe for discouragement. Yet like a gardener in Spring, I see small shoots of growth and life just where they should be.

In the North, I see some exploration of ways of going deeper in faith. Some are rebuilding links to the local community and opening up connections. While tentative, others are taking steps

forward rather than succumbing to despair.

In Woodend, I see people identifying with the church who have had no connection. I see a sense of belonging and hope. Questions are being asked how to make what is happening more of an expression of church. Food is shared, people are praying for one another, community is being built, ministry is exercised and mission is engaged. The marginalised are welcomed. Church is taking shape, even if it looks very different.

In Riddell, there are linkages between various activities. People drop in and chat. Faith is shared and questions asked. Acceptance is shown. Opportunities for prayer and worship are happening. Responses are tentative like small shoots pushing through the soil.

Tylden are exploring options and ideas, testing the water so to speak. Op Shop dinners, history group, community engagement and asking tough questions.

These are all but a few examples of life. It is early days but the movement of the Spirit is evident. At this point I would ask us all to consider the Vision of the Partnership and recommit to it. As leaders, we need to reach forward together in love and hope. Where we lack certainty or clarity, hold together and attune your eyes and ears for the Spirit's move. Allow yourselves to be pleasantly surprised.

As dot points, I would mention just some of the things I have been involved with:

- The web site I have taken over its management from Meagan Upsher. She has made herself available to assist as needed and has supported Gwynne Klaasen in development of Gisborne's library details ready for adding to the site. Thank you to everyone who have sent material for inclusion.
- The Film Club has restarted. I have undertaken an advertising regime locally. We have also obtain copyright licencing for video to

- show film in a club setting.
- I am continuing pastoral connections with the Oaks and Elms in Gisborne and the conducting of services.
- I have conducted several weddings this year.
 These are the first weddings I have conducted as part of the Partnership.
- I ran a seminar for worship leaders at Romsey at their request. It addressed the Gospel lectionary readings for the rest of the Church Year, highlighting the development of themes and issues from the readings.
- I have begun a course at CTM on Film and Theology called, "Watching for God – theology, the Bible and film". It is interesting, high-lighting how writers and directors use film to convey various ideas and thoughts. It is a great way to explore contemporary culture.
- I am planning on attending a course on Mental Health first aid in the coming weeks.

Annette is investigating a program for training and supporting congregational pastoral carers, and will discuss this with Ann Fyfield and Bev Gilbertson and report to the next meeting. It is an Australian program called the "Pastoral Partner Program" and it provides ongoing resourcing for congregations that are seeking to appoint, train and support their lay pastoral carers. If we think this is something useful for the congregations in the Partnership, we'll recommend it to the next CoCo meeting.

Wendy has been reflecting on her ministry with us over the last 3 years. This is in the context of her 3rd year review as required by Presbytery. Her passion for her call to the Partnership and commitment to its vision is foundational in her reflection. Her written report is available for perusal. Please speak to her if you would like a copy.

Wendy will be on annual leave from Thursday 22nd November until Sunday 9th December inclusive.
